Chelsea Landolin, MS, PMHNP School of Nursing

For her exceptional clinical expertise, innovative approach to psychiatric care, and unwavering dedication to professional development, Chelsea Landolin has been selected as the 2024 recipient of the Academic Senate's Clinical Excellence Award for Senior Faculty in the School of Nursing.

Advancing UCSF PRIDE Values

Landolin stands out as an exemplary clinician and leader, having pioneered several impactful programs to enhance mental health care access. She developed a successful integrated behavioral health program in UCSF Primary Care, increasing psychiatric care availability by 40%. The program is notable for its excellent generation of cost revenue, high patient and referring provider satisfaction, and a high rate of provision of psychotherapy along with medication management.

A passionate advocate for healthcare equity, Landolin has advanced interprofessional education initiatives, including cotraining Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner (PMHNP) and pharmacy trainees to address provider shortages. She has also played a key role in overcoming systemic barriers to NP practice in UCSF Health, creating collaborative partnerships across departments.

Known for her clinical expertise, patient-centered care, and commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion, Landolin is a dedicated mentor, educator, and advocate, deeply committed to enhancing the patient experience and advancing healthcare practices. UCSF Academic Senate

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Anna Strewler, AGNP-C School of Nursing

For her outstanding contributions to clinical education, interprofessional collaboration, and patient care, Anna Strewler has been selected as the 2024 recipient of the **Academic Senate's Clinical Excellence Award** for Early Career Faculty in the School of Nursing. Her work continues to inspire and shape the future of healthcare, both at UCSF and beyond.

Advancing UCSF PRIDE Values

Strewler has played a pivotal role in developing patient care programs, including the San Francisco VA (SFVA) Primary Care Nurse Practitioner (NP) Residency Program, which integrates interprofessional learning and specialty rotations, such as women's health, to better address the complex needs of veteran populations. As program director from 2016-2022, she led this innovative program to become the first NP residency program in California to receive accreditation by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education. Her team's work has greatly expanded access to comprehensive, high-quality care for women veterans, an underserved group within the VA system

Strewler serves as Co-Director of the SFVA Center of Excellence, where she leads interprofessional teams to discuss complex patient cases. This program has set a national example for team-based care and interdisciplinary collaboration, earning widespread recognition through publications and conferences.

Strewler is also deeply committed to advancing diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI). She spearheaded a relationship-centered mentoring program designed to recruit and support trainees from underrepresented backgrounds in nursing. Her efforts have helped create a more inclusive healthcare workforce while addressing healthcare disparities for marginalized communities.
